


Paperboard boxes (cereal, pasta, tissue etc.)



#1 - #7 Plastic containers (excluding #6)



Corrugated cardboard (flattened)



Recycling Tips:

- No plastic bags. Resist the temptation to put your recyclables in plastic bags and throw them into your recycle cart/bin.
- Leave caps on. Loose caps are too small for our equipment to recognize and often end up with the glass. We prefer lids and caps remain securely on bottles/jars.
- Rinsing out containers is not necessary (unless you want to avoid an odor problem in your container).
- Pizza boxes are not recyclable. While they are made of cardboard, the grease from the pizza contaminates the recycling process. The same goes for paper plates.
- Shredded paper is a problem for our equipment. While it is recyclable, because of the size, it falls through the machinery and ends up in the glass as garbage.

These items are not accepted:

- Styrofoam
- Electronic waste (batteries, cell phones, computers, etc.)
- Hazardous waste (paint, pesticides, cleaners)
- Used oil or oil containers
- Window panes, mirrors, ceramics
- Medical waste (syringes, needles, etc.)
- Yard waste
- Food waste
- Trash
