- Interviewed department heads & employees
- Benchmarked against peers in neighboring communities
- Deployed town survey



A LOOK BACK (2021)

KEY FINDINGS

- Financial challenges
 - An unsustainable path
 - Town & Water Department spending more than taking in
 - Limited revenue & growth opportunities
 - Use of monies are often restricted
- Other areas in need of improvement
 - Infrastructure
 - Other assets
 - Employee engagement
 - Silos & barriers between departments
 - Permit & inspection bottlenecks at Building Dept.
 - Community engagement
 - Town beautification



A LOOK BACK (2021)

THE PLAN

Cost reductions

- Spending freeze instituted
- BFC helps improve budget creation & tracking process
- Each BFC member is a liaison to a different department
- Reorganization of Street & Water Dept.; reduced headcount
- Police Dept. reconfigures work schedules; eliminating a lot overtime
- Reducing Police Dept. vehicles from 4 to 3 & replaces entire fleet of vehicles
- Renegotiated insurance policy & rates; more for less

Additional revenues

- Asset sales generate over \$100k
- Re-established CCD (Cumulative Capital Development) tax rate
- Re-established the user fee portion of Sanitation charges for debris pickup
- > \$282k received from CARES Act & American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)
- Rework of Building Dept. fee schedule
- Increased activity for new construction & other property improvements



A LOOK BACK (2021-YTD 2023)

THE RESULTS

- Police Department
 - New fleet of vehicles & moving from (4) SUVs to (3) trucks
 - Increased training for officers
 - New safety equipment for first responder activities
 - Additional police coverage for beach during holidays
 - New Flock (ALPR) camera system
 - Cher critical equipment (body cameras, tasers, vests, vehicle cameras, etc.)
- Streets, Sanitation, & Water Department
 - New water meters, fully automated & no more manual readings (ARPA)
 - New multi-purpose truck
 - New salt spreaders & plows for trucks
 - A lot of vehicle repair & maintenance (street sweeper, leaf vac, TopKick, truck, etc.)
 - Dry well repair & replacement
 - Paint & flush 90 fire hydrants
 - Road repair & maintenance
 - Land maintenance & improvement (mowing, tree trimming, clearing invasives, etc.)



A LOOK BACK (2021-YTD 2023)

THE RESULTS

- *Building Department
 - Reduced turn times for permits & inspections
 - Improved ease of doing business
 - Increased activity for new construction, remodels, & other property improvements
 - Increased revenues (permitting & property tax revenues)
- * Employees
 - > Better pay & benefits, including an option for family healthcare coverage
 - One-time premium pay bonus utilizing ARPA dollars
 - Cross-training to minimize impact of PTO & LOA
 - > Optimize & realign job responsibilities for better efficiencies
 - Removed silos & improved relationships & morale



A LOOK BACK (2021-YTD 2023)

THE RESULTS

Beautification

- Exterior improvements at Town Hall (landscaping, planter boxes, wood posts, etc.)
- New sign project: wooden posts, wayfinding brackets, combined signage
- Replacement of several mailbox roof racks w/cedar shingles
- Increased effort trim trees & remove dead trees
- Improved accessways (#19 refurbished & reopened + new benches)

Other items

- New ADA-compliant website, paid with CARES Act money
- Online bill payment for water bills & other town services
- Creation of Recognition Committee
- Hybrid physical & virtual meetings
- Seasonal parking restrictions broadened to alleviate increased beach activity
- Increased outreach to neighboring communities, NPS, & other key political figures
- Continued focus on beach erosion & shoreline protection issues
- New contract with ODVFD, \$12k ARPA money given by the Town
- New roof at Town Hall



UPDATE

PROJECTS & INITIATIVES FOR 2023 & BEYOND

- Road repair & maintenance
 - ≥ 2023 work completed, more to follow soon
- Continued dry well repair & replacement work
 - Most problematic ones done, ongoing work now in CAPEX plan & annual budget
- Upgrades to IT-related infrastructure
 - Not yet started but big priority in 2024
- ❖ 100-year anniversary plans
 - Committee works has begun, lots of ideas, & full year of events anticipated
- Increased efforts to secure various grants
 - Work beginning, more resources & master plan will be helpful to these efforts
- Bike trail
 - No update, town passed resolution of no trail going through town
- Continued improvement of engagement with employees & residents
 - Exploring town-sanctioned social media page & another town survey






GENERAL FUND CONSERVATIVE ESTIMATE / UNCERTAINTY IN REVENUE & COSTS









MVH & LRS FUNDS MORE STABILITY & LESS PRESSURES



PARKS & RECS FUND CHANGES ARE WORKING









PROJECTED CASH FLOWS / OUTFLOWS


ALL CORE FUNDS (GENERAL, MVH, LRS, PARKS & REC)








LIT/CEDIT FUND KEY CAPITAL EXPENSE FUND








CCD FUND OTHER KEY CAPITAL EXPENSE FUND

NEW THIS YEAR

- Wireless meters
 - > 100% of meters are wireless
 - ➤ Daily volume and leak detection
 - ➤ No more estimated billing
 - > Future: resident portal
- Pump house upgrades
 - ➤ New NIPSCO underground electrical service
 - ➤ New VFDs, control panel
 - ➤ Pelican Software Warning System
- Online bill pay

CURRENT FINANCES

Operating = \$150,886.99 Capital Improvement = \$65,298.10 Total = \$216,185.09

Currently

Operating = \$132,948 Capital Improvement = \$195,403 Total = \$328,351



UPCOMING EXPENDITURES

- Pump station renovations
 - New roof
 - Siding
 - Insulation
 - Doors
 - Estimated cost = \$110,000
- Pump station landscaping (spring)
- Water main repairs
 - Breaks will happen from time to time
 - Costs are generally around \$1,000/foot
 - Average range of costs to repair a break is \$5,000-\$25,000
